Born in vibrant Miami to a close-knit yet wildly dysfunctional Caribbean-American family, my life began in duality: the pulsating rhythms of island culture on one side, and the shadows of pain and silence on the other. Now, at 50, as a proud African-American gay man, I see my story not as tragedy, but as a powerful anthem of resilience, artistry, and truth.

In my deeply religious household, "same gender loving" wasn't just misunderstood—it was vilified. Scripture was weaponized, and silence was demanded over self-expression. Archaic ideas of masculinity clashed with my nuanced, creative spirit and aching need to sing, move, and write. Layered atop rampant addiction and family chaos, survival meant navigating dangerously sharp edges daily.

In those dark chapters, I found my calling: the performing arts. Musical theater became both salvation and sanctuary. When I couldn't voice my truth at home or in church, I whispered it through Stephen Sondheim's lyrics, Alvin Ailey's choreography, and August Wilson's stories. Every note and scene helped me build the courage to live out loud.

The stage wasn't just an escape—it was sacred. Repertory theaters, dance rehearsals, and late-night jam sessions became my haven. Among other misfits and dreamers, I wasn't "other." I belonged. There, I discovered storytelling's power not just to entertain, but to heal.

That healing shaped a thriving career. Today, I am an award-winning songwriter, playwright, stage director, teaching artist, and producer. My work has graced stages nationwide, amplifying stories too often silenced. I teach young people from marginalized backgrounds that their pain, joy, identity, and dreams deserve space—in the world and onstage.

To borrow from Langston Hughes, life ain't been no "crystal stair." I carry scars of repression and survival, but also banners of triumph. The arts didn't just shape my career—they saved my soul. They offered a mirror to see myself and a microphone to be heard. When my own family fractured, the arts became my kin.

I am living proof that the arts are not a luxury; they are a lifeline. And my purpose now is to open those same doors for others still finding their way through the dark.
